Even before arriving in DC for my first year on Howard's campus, the pandemic had created a spiritual challenge for myself and the members of my home parish in Jamaica. Gathering restrictions and livestreamed Masses caused enthusiasm and togetherness to decline. I was excited to attend in-person Masses in the States, but, not yet knowing about HU Bison Catholic, I was concerned about entering a new church community. Would I need to commute to a nearby parish alone every Sunday? Would I be able to continue my vocation of reading and altar serving?

Fortunately, I met an inspiring group of students who wanted to grow in their faith as I did. It was refreshing to see everyone willing to learn the basics of being a lector, sacristan or altar server and join forces to stage our small Sunday evening Masses. As students at an HBCU, it was also rewarding for us to have roles in the Archdiocese of Washington's Mass celebrating Black History Month.

I also got to know other students while sharing our intentions, praying the rosary, talking about our journeys on our Fall retreat and catching up on the campus events after Mass each week. There was never a dull moment in our weekly fellowship sessions either. I particularly enjoyed our discussion with Santonio Hill from Vagabond Missions, who encouraged us, using his journey, to listen and be attentive to God's call and plan for our lives. It was a relevant topic for young people facing internal conflicts deciding on majors, career paths and future goals. Personally, his story motivated me to be more purposeful about evangelizing pursuing our ministry's goal of sharing our faith and reaching a wider audience. I pray that our ministry can continue to bring laughter, companionship and more meaningful discussions to the Howard community next year.


